This year's E&H women's soccer team has already broken a school record seven games into the season.

What record have they broken? So far, the women's team is an undefeated 7-0 (1-0) on the season. That's impressive, but even more impressive is that the Wasps have broken the school record for most consecutive games won. Perhaps the most telling statistic for the Wasps is their goal differential, which currently is 31-2.

Freshman keeper Hayley Poland is a big reason for the Wasps' success, allowing only an average of 0.29 goals per game, while opposing keepers have averaged 4.44 goals allowed per game.

Nikki Greco leads the team with nine goals, which helped her to earn ODAC Conference Player of the Week earlier in the season.

Katelyn LePore has also fired five goals home, and Amber Ferrell has contributed three goals. Five other players on the team have all scored two goals.

In their most recent victory, a

2-0 win over Randolph at home, Loren Favale scored midway through the first half (31') to put the Wasps up 1-0. The finishing touches were put on the game when Stephanie Jones scored on a cross from Amber Ferrell (55').

Though Randolph did not play poorly, it was clear that they were outmatched by a superior Wasp team.

The Wasps will look to continue their hot streak, and extend their school record of consecutive victories on Sept. 20 at conference opponent Bridgewater at 3 p.m.
